VII. <u>Sanctification</u> – The lifelong process of being made holy through the believer's cooperation with the Spirit's transforming power – (Heb 10:14; 2 Cor 3:18; Phil 2:12–13):

VIII. <u>Glorification</u> – The final and complete transformation of the believer into Christ's image – (Rom 8:30;
Phil 3:20–21; 1 Jn 3:2):
